Keynote Presentations

Janet Scott, *Former Manager, SCTCI, Former Chair, Communication Matters*

Time travelling in AAC – past, present and future

AAC is a relatively new field, it has come far in its 40 odd years history. How has the past influenced current practice? What might the future of AAC look like? Janet will take you on a journey from those early days of AAC, to the current day, with a look to the future.

Looking into the Crystal Ball ... How do we harness the Potential of Technology?

AAC is more than technology. How can our understanding of AAC shape the design of future AAC technologies? Annalu will explore the reasons why individuals abandon AAC technology and suggest ways in which we can influence the AAC of future.

Workshop Choices

Session 1 (11.30 - 12.30)

1A. AAC and Aphasia: What matters? *Laorag Hunter, Amy Hanschell, NHS Tayside*

We will explore factors that make a difference in the use of AAC for people with aphasia. We will reflect upon AAC successes and failures in our own practice and will look at how research can support AAC decision making.

1B. Using CALL Scotland's Bookbug symbol resources for shared reading.

In this workshop, participants will have the opportunity to explore the range of symbolised resources and digital books available to accompany the Bookbug Bags, which are gifted each year by Scottish Book Trust. They will also get hands-on practise using them with a range of suitable communication devices, from Big Macks and GoTalks to iPads, as part of an interactive storytelling session.

1C. The PAMIS Digital Passport. *Catriona Jamieson, PAMIS*

How does someone with profound and multiple disabilities tell their story? How do they have the conversations about health, care needs, feelings, likes and dislikes and their history that people without profound and multiple disabilities take for granted? How do we support them, their families and the practitioners around them to ensure safe, effective, person-centred care? The PAMIS digital passport is a flick through e-book that helps people with profound and multiple disabilities communicate effectively with their family, their carers and their friends.

Session 2 (14.00 - 15.00)

2A. A Communication Friendly Environment *Fiona Buttle Principal Teacher Leader Valley School Scottish Borders Council, Ellen Baird, Speech & Language Therapist, NHS Borders*

A talk about how we have created a communication friendly environment in our new school. Moving in to a new building we were able to audit what we were doing and plan the strategies and practice we wanted to use going forward. This presentation will look at how we have created what we consider a communication friendly environment and what the key elements of this are.

2B Developing the use of AAC assessment toolkits in a Speech and Language Therapy Service. *Jane Donnelly & Cordelia Manson Fife AAC Team*

The presentation will focus on the rationale, implementation and outcomes of introducing AAC assessment toolkits for use by a Speech and Language Therapy Service with both Paediatric and Adult clients.

2C Voicebanking: An Introduction and Overview *Dr Phillipa Rewaj, Anne Rowling Regenerative Neurology Clinic*

Voicebanking has become increasingly popular and more readily available over the last few years, with more and more current and potential AAC users choosing to create their own synthetic voice. This workshop will give an overview of voicebanking, outlining what services are available and what they entail. We will also look at developments in the Edinburgh University Speak:Unique Voicebank Project, and there will be opportunity to try out some of the voicebanking software being developed.
